Leadership Conference combined with Fall Conference this year, October 12-14

The Theatre Leadership Conference (TLC) is back, and it is now part of the CTAM Fall Conference, October 12-14, in the Flint/Grand Blanc area. Beginning Friday evening and continuing through Sunday morning, theatre leaders from around the state will have the chance to network with others who do the same thing, have their questions answered, and learn from each other. Both paid staff and Board members from theatres with no staff work together to learn what shows are hits and misses, how to solve Board challenges, effective marketing tips, fund-

raising ideas, how to budget, new technical options, and other topics they choose themselves in a pre-conference survey.

The weekend is moderated by Allen Ebert, an AACT Board member, who currently is the Executive Director of the Children's Theater of Madison. Previously Allen was the Executive Director at La Crosse Community

Theatre and served as the Entertainment Director of the Army's Soldier's Theatre in Vicenza, Italy. Ebert has been an advocate for the arts for more than 23 years. He has managed various theaters, large and small, and has directed and performed in more than 100 productions. He

has extensive knowledge in marketing, teaching, audience development, board management, consulting and directing. We are excited to have his enthusiasm and vast knowledge at the helm of this conference.

Our goals for the TLC are to send your theatre leaders home with knowledge that can help your organization improve and grow, provide a bridge between the theatres with staff and those who have not reached that level, and make it less costly and time consuming for your theatres to gain knowledge - one conference that answers your administrative needs while others from your organization learn acting, directing, and technical skills.

The TLC has sessions Friday night, Saturday morning, Saturday afternoon, and Sunday morning. Participants will dine with everyone else at the conference and will be able to attend the Saturday night general conference activities. There will be time available for theatres with comparable budgets to work together on problem solving.

It's a lot of learning packed into one weekend, but your theatre will soon see the benefits both financially and administratively. As one regular Madison attendee always says, he never goes home without at least one idea that pays for the cost of his weekend.





An honor to one of our own, The Sauk in Jonesville has been selected as one of the six theaters nationally to premiere one of the winning AACT NewPlayFest 2020 plays! Quite an honor!

Started in 1961 as the Broad Street Players, the organization purchased the former Jonesville Opera House in 1971 and converted it into what is now the Sauk Theatre. Also known as Hillsdale Community Theatre, they produce a five-show mainstage and a three-show SaukSeconds season, and host both a local improvisational troupe and a professional Shakespeare company annually. Each summer, Plays-in-Development readings are produced and new plays are also presented as part of the annual Sauk Shorts, an evening of 10-minute plays.

In addition, local schools and a local children's theatre company use the theatre for their productions. An annual series of workshops is offered, ranging in topics from stage combat, to improv to understanding Shakespeare's texts.

This is a great honor and CTAM offers our congratulations to The Sauk. It will be a challenging undertaking, to be sure.

The Scoop on Scripts

Hello, Summer! Boy, do we deserve it! Little time warp on my part: in the last column, I said Tawas Bay Players was doing Messiah on the Frigidaire this summer. Not! We are doing Revival at Possum Kingdom Community Church mid-July (check "Who's Doing What" in the Callboard for dates). Come see it! It's a delightful script and Tawas rocks in the summer time!

Leaving Iowa: A Comedy about Family Vacations by Tim Clue and Spike Manton ©2008, (Dramatic Publishing) is a delight. As I was reading it reminded me of The Office, and The Middle. The Middle for setting and family and The Office because of the unique characters and witty repartee. Cast includes two men: Don Brown as an adult and a boy.....same actor however: and Don's father.....an actor who looks old enough to be Don's dad. Don's mother and his sister, past and present, finish the nuclear family. Twenty-seven other characters appear throughout the play and can be played by a minimum of one man and one woman, 27 actors or somewhere in between. Don, a middleaged writer, returns to his lowa home to retrieve his father's ashes so he can return them to Dad's childhood home. As the old homestead has been turned into a grocery store, Don travels around lowa looking for a suitable place to distribute the ashes. The action traverses time with Don's mom and sister appearing on the classic family road trip from twenty years ago. The 27 characters that the family meet along the way add lots of humor to this tale of family squabbles and love. A minimum set is recommended with the actors making the moves, and avoiding tedious scene changes. Your audience will hoot as they are reminded of their own family tips!

Radium Girls is a historical drama by D. W. Gregory, written in 2001 and needs an ensemble of at least four men and five women. The cast can be expanded as needed. Only one man and one woman are not double cast. Set in Orange, New Jersey between 1908 and 1928, set design must be fluid. Eight wooden chairs and 2 -3 narrow tables remain on stage through out and the cast sets up the scenes, often while a conversation is occurring. Scenes are defined by lighting, props, sound and accessories added to the very simple costumes.

The plot revolves around Grace, who at 15 starts painting dials at the US Radium plant. World War II looms and luminescent radium is being painted on timepieces to save the soldiers in their foxholes. But as girls start getting sick and dying, the company fights culpability and Grace's tenacity makes for a powerful story. It's a serious play, but topical to this day.

Quilters, A Musical by Molly Newman and Barbara Damashek, Dramatists Play Service, ©1992 is based on a book of the true stories of guilters who were American pioneers. In the play, the author uses an imaginary Sara Bonham and her six daughters to tell this oral history of joy, heartache, love, jealousy, bravery, guilt, pride and regrets. Although there are no big numbers, the music and stories are charming. Seven



women from late teen thru 60 are needed and five taking bit parts). A short ballet sequence is part of the play also. An

empty stage is turned into many different scenes by the actors. Each story is represented by an iconic quilt block pattern. Tawas presented this show several years ago and our director, Carol Kushion, recruited quilters from five counties to display their quilts, and two quilts were made; one to be displayed at the end of the play and one was raffled off with the proceeds going to a local women's shelter. If you are looking for a small musical and an opportunity for outreach, you might want to take a look at Quilters.
