

## July 13 to 15, 2018 at Higgins Lake Master Classes this summer to cover acting, directing and costuming!

Two master classes on crucial theatre production topics with top-notch instructors are offered in July, 2018. What more do you want? All we need are eager participants who are willing to devote a weekend to improving their skills.

Actor and Director: Working Together will be taught by Penny Notter, the recently retired Associate Director of Grand Rapids Civic Theatre. She was also the director of GRT's School of Theatre. She had extensive experience as an actor and has directed dozens of shows.



most at theatres in the Grand Rapids area. Penny received a BA in theatre from Indiana University and a MA with a focus on directing from Indiana State University. She has previously conducted workshops for CTAM and AACT. This master class is for both actors and directors. It will explore the relationships of actors and directors to each other and the preparation required by both to co-exist in a productive environment. During this class directors will have an opportunity to direct and actors will act. This class is about the collaboration needed for a successful production.

So You've Agreed to Design Costumes. Now what? will be conducted by Joy Butler. This class will explore the steps used to communicate through costume design and execution beginning with building a foundation through script analysis and building a production team. You



will learn how to give the actor some of the tools needed to visually communicate his/her character, creating the look of an ensemble piece, and sourcing your ideas. Organizational tools and budget will also be considered. Joy has an MFA in theatre from Western Illi-

nois University and has taught undergraduate and graduate courses in several areas including history of theatre, costume design, costume construction, and costume crafts. Although she has worked extensively in educational and professional theatre, for the past several years she has been the volunteer chair of costumes at Bay City Players.

Please note: Both instructors will ask that participants in their classes read a few plays before taking their class. You will receive a short list after you have registered.

The class sessions will begin early Friday evening, July 13, and continue through Sunday morning, July 15. You will be done by noon!

The class registration fee is \$85 for individual CTAM members and \$95 for non-members. The fee for two nights' lodging and four meals is \$167 for a shared room (two people) and \$187 for one person in a room. The registration deadline is June 29 and there will be no refunds for the MacMullan lodging and meals fee after that date. Check the website for an online registration form — which will be available soon. Or you can contact Nancy Peska, Executive Secretary, directly and register with her.

The RAM Center is located at 104 Conservation Drive, Roscommon, MI 48653, It is 1.5 miles east of US 27 and five miles west of 1-75. If you go to the Department of Natural Resources website and click on the MacMullan Center on the left side, they provide maps and a delightful video, showing you the facilities.

# Getting ready for next year's AACTfest!

It's never too early to start thinking about your entry for AACTfest next spring! Sponsored by AACT (American Association of Community Theatre), AACTfest is part of a multi-year process that culminates in a national festival, held in odd-numbered years. Community theatres from AACT's 10 regions enter productions for adjudication and advancement from state to regional to national level. AACTFest is thus a celebration of theatre and a learning experience for those who take part.

Michigan is in Region III (Michigan, Wisconsin, Indiana, Illinois and Ohio). Our state festival will be in Owosso next spring; regionals will be in Kokomo, IN and nationals will be in Gettysburg., PA/. (Check the calendar on Page 2 for exact dates.)

Our 2017 Michigan winner, Venus in Fur from Midland Center Stage, went on to nationals and -- although they didn't win first place -- were widely lauded for their moving and difficult show. We're so proud of them!

You and your Board should be looking at your options and getting people, money and scripts into place. The deadline for application to state is generally at year-end. We asked several Michiganders how they go about all this and here are their responses.

#### From Tara Western, Tawas Bay Players.

Tawas Bay Players, my home group, has entered AACTfest twice. Based on observing that process, I see that choosing a condensed version of a regular season production is the easiest. Although, our 2017 entry, *Love, Loss, and What I Wore* was not in our regular season, but a second-stage show.

Regarding the logistics: check on rights immediately, get a commitment from the cast for the long haul: state, regional, national (a girl can dream!), design a set that is simple-ish and transportable, and get your community on board, as you will probably need some fundraising.

What kind of show? Selfishly, I like to see things that I haven't seen. Examples: The God of Carnage, Revival at Possum Kingdom Community Church, Lone Star or Freud's Last Session. Personally, I love seeing a "hidden (to me) gem" that might be a possibility for future seasons at Tawas Bay Players.

#### Mary Jo Denolf, Grand Rapids Civic Theatre.

We have a volunteer committee who raises funds for AACTfest all year and narrows suggested scripts to six. From there we look at how those six can be cut and what restrictions we have on the cutting. We then look at length, set requirement, how many in cast and the travel expense for such.

All fund must be raised by the committee as Grand Rapids Civic Theatre does not have a line item in our budget for this outreach. Fundraising is done mostly by lobby table sales at other GRCT productions such as *Beauty and the Beast* (roses), *Seussical* (hats) and *Fancy Nancy* (tiaras and boas). They also secured a \$1,000 sponsor which helped in travel costs to the State festival. Ticket sales for their rehearsals/performances on our stage are by donation and that helps with expenses.

#### David Wahr, Monroe Community Players.

We look for something that is different and unique and/or something someone has a passion for. Nothing is off limits and if it's a new work, even better!

#### Mary Lou Britton, Grosse Pointe Theatre.

We have a hard time focusing on something that seems so far away because we're always busy stamping out fires on our home turf. However, we generally survey the membership for someone who would like to suggest a property to the Board and agree to see it through to the end. Very minimal funds are allocated to AACTfest, so fundraising is an important responsibility.

Unless it's an original, getting permission to cut seems to be a stumbling block for us, too. We had all the ducks lined up last time...and the author denied permission at the last minute! Very disappointing, so we need to start sooner this time.

### Write that Play Today!

Fame and fortune await you! Pick up your pen, pencil, or keyboard and put your creative muses to work. The 2018 playwriting contest is underway and you can/should enter. The contest is open to any Michigan author and almost any type of play will be considered - comedy, tragedy, melodrama, psychological thriller, history . . . (no musicals or children's plays, though).

#### Plays will be judged on:

- Feasibility could this play be done by a typical community theatre group?
- Essentials Is there a protagonist? Antagonist? Is there a believable dramatic conflict?
   Is there resolution?
- Mood and Genre Is the mood clearly developed? Does the audience "get" it?
- Characters Are they developed? Necessary to the play? Is the dialog believable?
   Does the resolution fit the character?
- Structure and Plot Does the play move well from beginning to end? Is each scene relevant and important? Will the plot hold an audience?
- Overall Rating Is the dramatic situation engaging for the audience? Are the characters real? Can you "see" the play being performed?

# The Bcoop on Bcripts

April is the cruelest month.......April Fool! Although it can be, weather-wise! This month: a nostalgic musical, an over the top comedy and a comedy with drama.

Moonlight and Magnolias by Ron Hutchinson ©2004 is set in 1939, in the office of movie mogul, David O. Selznick, 37 years old. The movie, Gone with the Wind, has been shut down because the script is awful, and the director is clueless. Selznick, commands director Victor Fleming, 50, and famed writer, Ben Hecht, 45, to his office, where he locks them in for five days, rewriting the first half of the movie. The lone female, Miss Poppenghul (age flexible), is Selznick's long-suffering secretary, a small but delightful role.

As Hecht hasn't read the novel, Selznick and Flem-

ing re-enact the plot (hilarious!), bicker and swear on a diet of bananas and peanuts. Lots of BAD language flies, side-splitting and frequent physical schtick ensues, and a huge mess is created as the screenplay is written, and rewritten, and rewritten. Technical chal-



lenges include Gone with the Wind lighting and sound effects, and did I mention bad language? Race and the precarious position of Jewish executives in Hollywood are also discussed.

The Marvelous Wonderettes by Roger Bean ©1999 published by Steele Springs Stage Rights, is a delightful musical for baby boomers and anyone else who likes oldies. The setting is the high school gymnasium in 1968 and 1978. The Wonderettes are four girls who are about 18 in ACT I and 28 in ACT II at their ten-year reunion. The music is at times sheer entertainment (Mr. Sandman, Lollipop, Heatwave) and sometimes reflects each

girl's personal story (It's My Party, You Don't Own Me, Leader of the Pack, R-E-S-P-E-C-T, Lipstick on Your Collar) The audience participates, as they vote for prom queen, and a Mr. Lee is chosen from the audience for the song "Mr. Lee, Mr. Lee." Costumes are pretty easy: a 1958 prom dress for Act I and a 1968 vibe for Act II. Suitable for ages 10 plus, the music rocks!

Many iterations of the Wonderettes exist, but as I saw the Winter Wonderettes, I will tell you it is a delightful Christmas show. Published in 2003, the four girls are still 28, home for Christmas to entertain at Harper's Hardware holiday party. A slim, but charming plot once again, with melodic Christmas songs fitting in nicely. Challenges for both musicals: four women to play 18 and 28 that can sing solos, harmonize, exude personality and exhibit skillful physical comedy. Once again, one costume each, but much more set décor in Winter Wonderettes.

The Messiah on the Frigidaire, a dramatic comedy by John Culbertson, was published by Samuel French in 2008. The setting is a trailer park in small town South Carolina, where the shadow of Jesus' face appears every afternoon on the fridge which is on the front porch of a young couple's trailer. The small town goes crazy with visitors daily including a City Councilman wanting to turn it into a tourist attraction, and a mother who believes her blind son will be healed by visiting the shadow of Jesus. Four men (2-30+, one 40+, one 50 +) and one nine-year-old boy, two strong women charac-

woman slightly older
are needed. Setting is
present time, with an
exterior set of the yard
in front of a trailer
home. The southern
trailer park lifestyle is
not mocked but
treated with humor

and a lovely message is imparted. The scene with the blind boy is tragic when his mother slaps him for not being healed, but the ignorance of the mother is highlighted, rather than child abuse. Suitable for ages 14 plus, the Tawas Bay Players are producing this show in July of this year. Come see us! And as always, contact me at tarawestern@hotmail.com
