# Fall Conference plans and workshops announced for October 12-14!

## **TLC Leadership Program**

Beginning Friday evening and continuing through Sunday morning, theatre leaders from around the state will have the chance to network with others who do the same thing, have their questions answered, and learn from each other. Both paid staff and Board members from theatres with no staff work together to learn what shows are hits and misses, how to solve Board challenges, effective marketing tips, fundraising ideas, how to budget, new technical options, and other topics they choose themselves in a pre-conference survey.



Participants will dine with everyone else at the conference and will be able to attend the Saturday night general conference activities. There will be time available for theatres with comparable budgets to work together on problem solving.

Leader: The weekend is moderated by Allen Ebert,

an AACT Board member, who currently is the Executive Director of the Children's Theater of Madison WI. Previously Allen was the Executive Director at La Crosse Community Theatre and served as the Entertainment Director of the Army's Soldier's Theatre in Vicenza, Italy. Ebert has been an advocate for the arts for more than 23 years. He has managed various theaters, large and small, and has directed and performed in more than 100 productions. He has extensive knowledge in marketing, teaching, audience development, board management, consulting and directing. We are excited to have his enthusiasm and vast knowledge at the helm of this conference.

## The Youth Program

This fall, in keeping with the conference's theme of "It's All Greek to Me," our youth will be studying Greek Tragedy through one of the foremost examples of the genre, the classic *Antigone*, but with a twist. The form of Greek

Tragedy is a cornerstone of the educational weekend for our young people, and they will dissect *Antigone 1856*, while discussing their new vocabulary words! Who doesn't want to throw around words like "catharsis" after a big test, or tell their sports rival how much "hubris" they displayed on the field?



The young people will be performing the 35-minute Antigone 1856, which takes place as the Civil War is ending. The same story of honor, loyalty, and love is applicable to a variety of conflicts and settings because the themes of Greek Tragedy are universal.

This subject matter may sound heavy or too expansive for a young person to comprehend in a short time frame, but young minds expand to fit the information they are given.

Leader: Kathryn Willis is the Founder and Executive Artistic Director of The Downeaster Theatre in Lansing, MI. Her other theatre credits over the last 20 years include makeup artist, costumer, director, actress, stage manager, and props master. Kathryn's specialty and passion is children's theatre, and she is delighted to be asked back to teach this conference!

#### Painting Better Sets Easier

If you've ever wrestled with how to get more visual impact onto your stage this workshop may be just for you. Tips on adding depth and layers to your surfaces will enhance the design and kick things up a notch. We'll show you several easy, quick, and simple-to-teach techniques that anyone can do and share with others on your paint crew. In addition to Toning we'll also explore two popular faux finishes that find their way into many a scenic design: Wood-graining and Marbleizing. With a new arsenal of Dos and Don'ts in your possession, you'll have greater confidence in executing your designer's vision and your production values will rise to the next level. Join us for this very hands-on

workshop and you may surprise yourself and what you can accomplish! (PLEASE NOTE: This will be an all-day workshop (9:00 am to 2:00 pm) and will be held offsite at the Fenton Village Players. Lunches will be delivered to participants! Dress appropriately!)

Workshop leader: Matt McCormick has been designing scenery and painting sets for nearly 30 years. Following a beginning in publishing and graphic design his foray into theatre has taken him from his native Michigan to many venues in the Midwest, south and northeast. In addition to numerous freelance designs he has worked as a scenic artist for STAGES St Louis in St Louis, MO and was also the Scenic Charge Artist at Northern Stage in White River Junction, VT. While in Florida he was the Resi-

dent Designer/Scenic Charge for four seasons at Theatre Tallahassee and he also designed for the Sugden Theatre in Naples, the Twin City Stage in Winston-Salem, NC, and the Electric Theatre Co in Scranton, PA. Matt was on staff as the Scenic Charge at Coastal Carolina University's Department of Theatre and also designed for Atlantic Stage, both in Myrtle Beach, SC. In Traverse City, he designs and paints at the Old Town Playhouse and also for Parallel 45 Theatre, when his schedule allows. Matt holds a B.F.A. in Fine Art from Northern Michigan University and is excited for the opportunity to share some tips and techniques with CTAM's workshop participants.

### Play Structure: Fundamental Script Analysis for Directors.

There exists a map in every play. A structure that holds the story together. As a director it is our responsibility to know how to see and read that map in order to effectively guide our cast and crew to bring the play to life. This workshop will explore the fundamentals of play structure and script analy-

sis as well as offer tools on how to use that knowledge to improve your rehearsal process.

Workshop leader: James Kuhl is honored to be Tipping Point Theatre's Producing Artistic Director since 2009. Tipping Point Theatre is one of Michigan's leading professional theatres located in Northville, Ml. James received his Bachelor of Arts in Theatre from Alma College and his Masters of Fine Arts in Acting from Wayne State University. He is a past winner of the Heck Rabi Playwriting Competition, as well as a Wilde Award and Pulsar Award Nominee. James is an accomplished actor and director and has worked with many of Michigan's professional theatre companies. He is a Part Time Faculty member at Wayne State University with the Department of Theatre and Dance and sits on the Advisory Board for the Detroit Public Theatre and The Mitten Lab.

#### **Making Your Stage Dialects Believable**

Get a better grasp on some accents for the stage! This workshop will introduce you to -- and help familiarize you with -- some of the key sounds that differentiate certain dialects from Standard American speech.

Workshop leader: Katie Cheely Wasserman, originally from Chicago, received a B.A in Theatre Arts and an M.F.A. in Acting. She has performed, directed and taught in Illinois, Rhode Island, Virginia, Tennessee, Ohio, and Michigan. She has three precious children, and a wonderful husband who is a history professor at Alma College.



#### You're a Real Character!

So, you've been cast in a great part. How do you go about creating a multi-faceted character that the audience will find interesting? Whether you're playing the lead or a part in the chorus, you'll find this fast paced, fun-filled workshop informative and helpful. We'll discuss acting technique in general with a focus on script analysis and the importance of sub-text. Every character has a back story. What's yours?



Workshop leader: Ben Zylman is a multi-award-winning actor and director whose career spans 40 years and 130 productions. A veteran of the stage, radio, television and film he has worked with Jerry Seinfeld, Chita Rivera, Mayim Bialik, Renee Taylor and Claire Bloom, as well as Grammy Award winning artists Meredith Arwady and Timothy Nordwind. ## Nonprofits and Political Campaigns – What's Legal?

A short word from Joanne Berry, CTAM Advocacy Chair:

With the ramping up of political campaigns before the November elections, it's important to review how the U.S. tax code affects 501 (c)(3) organizations, including community theatres.

The Johnson Amendment (named for Lyndon Johnson when he was a senator) is a provision in the U.S. tax code that prohibits 501(c) (3) organizations from partisan actions, including endorsing or opposing political candidates. Currently, many politicians are trying to change this law.

The value of the law to nonprofits, including arts organizations, is that such organizations are exempt from taxes (except for sale of merchandise) and donors who itemize may take a deduction for their contributions to 501(c)(3) organizations.

Be careful! The IRS warns that any contributions to political organizations or campaigns or statements favoring or opposing candidates are not allowed. You may encourage people to vote, but you may not encourage them to favor a particular candidate or action.





# Getting ready for AACTfest 2019: Adjudication

With the 2019 AACTfest just around the corner, we'll be bringing you a series of articles to help you prepare for the biennial competition. Today, the role of the adjudicator in the competition. This information holds true also for adjudications through CTAM for your local, non-competition productions.

The most important function of the adjudicator is to serve as an educator. True, individual awards must be selected, but adjudication without a carefully prepared critique, which teaches as it evaluates, would deprive festival participants of a most valuable feature—opportunity for qualitative improvement.

Adjudicators for festivals in the AACTFest cycle have a wide range of theatrical training and experience. They view each festival production and share their observations with the entering companies and the audience. Plays are adjudicated based on the overall production, with acting and directing as the major elements.

All types of productions (comedy, drama, original works, musicals, revues, avant-garde, "controversial," etc.) are acceptable entries to the festival and must be considered on a similar basis, with the best production being the one most fully realizing the intent of the material and the concept for the show.

Design and technical competence is to be given consideration as to its effectiveness as an integral part of the total production experience. Adjudicators may not question the choice of material, except as to its appropriateness for the company, and comment only on how it was performed.

Adjudicators are an independent second pair of eyes, looking at your production and seeing things you may not have noticed. Adjudications are not 're-directing' or a pass/fail situation, but rather a starting spot for improvement in future shows.

## Character Development Workshop a Success for Tawas Bay Players!

On June 10th, Betsy Willis from CTAM, conducted a Character Development workshop at the Tawas Bay Players theater in East Tawas. Betsy was invited to present the workshop because she is an experienced actress that is knowledgeable about all aspects of theatre as well as a trained adjudicator.

She was invited by TBP members Tara Western and Sue Duncan to assist those involved in the TBP summer production of *Revival at Possum Kingdom Community Church*. The workshop was provided free of charge to all members; non-members were welcome to attend by giving a small donation of their choosing. The eight members that attended enjoyed the workshop and shared very positive feedback.

The goal of Betsy's workshop was to help people learn how to make it a GREAT performance! She shared with us how to examine a script and we talked about a few questions (What does their dialogue say about them?) that could give many clues about what kind of person the character is, and how they may have become that person. Betsy also demonstrated a visualization technique for memorizing lines. using a monologue from the *Revival* script.

As a first time director of *Revival*, I found the workshop to be invaluable. It gave me the tools to discuss possible backstories with my cast, as well as a very effective method to learn lines. It reduced my anxiety about having the cast memorize every word because the visualization technique provided the framework to "fine tune" the dialogue as we got closer to the show.

Producer, Sue Duncan and I got busy planning to make the most of this wonderful opportunity. Since Linda would be with us for seven nights and several days, we wanted to showcase our theatre and community. Our schedule:

- Welcome dinner at the Boathouse Brewery (with four of her childhood friends!)
- ✓ A "Meet the Playwright" pizza party for our members at Barnacle Bill's. Philip Sturdevant, the director of the Holland Community Players' award-winning Revival joined us.
- ✓ Dinner at Northwoods, where Jamie Peterson, our adjudicator from Players de Noc, joined Linda, Sue Duncan and me, along with TBP members who regularly go to CTAM events.
- ✓ Pre-show talk for the Sunrise Side Lifelong Learners.

- ✓ An after-show "Talk back" where the cast, crew, director and Linda answered questions from the audience.
- ✓ Linda and her good writer friend, Sue Ryan, were able to attend our "end of the run" party and Linda received a tambourine as a memento.

As usual, we received great publicity from our local newspaper, the *losco News-Herald* and radio station, Carroll Broadcasting. As you know, it is difficult to measure the effect of your efforts, but all seven nights of our summer show (attendance being fairly erratic in a tourist town) had excellent houses.

The production of Revival at Possum Kingdom Community Church was dedicated to the late Vincent Weiler, longtime TBP and CTAM member. Linda LaRocque, met Vince initially at a play festival well over 20 years ago. At that time, he was one of the judges of the CTAM play writing competition. It was basically an unheard-of concept until several visionaries in the CTAM organization put their heads together and came up with the idea of sponsoring a play writing competition here in Michigan. Vincent was one of them. He believed in the project from its conception and that CTAM should promote new playwrights with new voices, so he encouraged participation of theaters throughout Michigan to step up and produce these original works. Decades have gone by and this competition has proven outrageously successful and, indeed, Vince and his theatre instincts were proven right as he helped pave the way for many aspiring playwrights.
