What is AACTFest?

The Owosso Community Players are proud to host the 2023 American Association of Community Theaters State Festival for Michigan: AACTfest!

AACTFest is the festival process that concludes in a national theatre festival. Sponsored by the <u>American Association of Community Theatre</u>, the festival is held in odd-numbered years. AACTfest presents a forum for community theatres from AACT's ten regions to enter productions for adjudication and advancement from the state level to the regional level and finally, to the national level.



Each competing team will have a 10×10 foot space on the stage. In each box is everything that can be used for a show – set, props and costumes. A signal is given, and the first show is off and running. Actors and production crew hustle to set up their show in less than 10 minutes – because that's when their show must begin. Each team's performance must be no longer than 60 minutes. They then have exactly 10 minutes to put it all back in their box and leave the stage.

How can I attend?

Competing groups can register for \$150. Your registration covers 8 participants. If your participating group is larger than 8 people, then each additional individual will need to complete an individual registration. Individual registration costs \$65 until February 1, 2023, at which point it goes up to \$75 per person. If you want to ATTEND as an audience member then you will also use the INDIVIDUAL REGISTRATION option and that will get you in to all shows and networking events. 

CTAM announces new workshop programing opportunities for affiliates

tarting this year, we are proud to announce CTAM's On the Road to You! This new twist on our traditional conference format allows affiliate groups to bring a presenter to them for a specific area of development and at a minimal cost to the group. On the Road to You is designed to address a theater's needs in any area you can think of. Perhaps your group needs some tools for volunteer recruitment, makeup design, stage lighting, board development, strategic planning, or any other area you can think of. All you have to do is reach out to ctamthrives@gmail.com and tell us you want to schedule an On the Road to You.

Jamie Peterson reports that Players deNoc (Escanaba) will be the first theater testing out this new program. Lighting Design is what they need at this moment and CTAM has assisted in finding a workshop leader to come to their theatre and work with them, one on one.

How payment will work: Hosting theater will supply \$100 as a stipend and then provide lodging if the workshop leaders needs to travel and stay the night. CTAM will cover all cost of mileage and then an additional \$100 for a total of \$200 stipend.

Workshop leaders will spend about four hours with your theatre on a 1:1 basis and work with your volunteers.

Topics for workshops - we can provide workshop leaders on most any subject but ones we have thought about would be: Lighting, Sound, Volunteer Management, Board Development, Fund Raising, Grants, and the list goes on and on.

If interested contact ctamthrives@gmail.com With a letter of intent and we will send you an application to fill out with information for your theater, dates, subject matter and other information needed to find the right presenter for your theatre.

Many of you are already familiar with CTAM on the Road. This event was a way for theater

groups to host a conference, bring workshop instructors, other theaters, and a bit of fun to their members, all while saving money on travel. During each one of these events, members commented on how great it would be if a presenter could share their knowledge and passion directly with their home theater group. Members wanted more one-on-one training and in their own theaters to make the experience more attainable for those that could not travel to a conference. You asked for it, and CTAM is delivering it.

Simply tell us the area of theater that you wish to have a workshop in, and we will coordinate the arrangements to have an experienced presenter come to you. On the Road to You is designed to bring customized assistance to every affiliate group. CTAM covers the cost of milage for the presenter as well as a \$100 stipend for the workshop. The hosting theater is responsible for a \$100 stipend to the presenter and arranging suitable housing should the distance traveled justify and overnight stay. The personalized workshop allows for up to 4 hours of dedicated instruction and hosting theater groups are encouraged to welcome neighboring theaters to join them for the day, should they choose to do so.

The Scoop on Scripts



What's your group doing for the holidays? Tawas Bay Players has a single night of "Christmas Songs and Stories" and our WE Players performed *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever*.

Playscripts' *The Spoon River Project* ©2021 adapted by Tom Andolora is a compelling play that would be a perfect endeavor for fall. It can

be performed in your theatre or staged in a cemetery. The playwright provides lots of tips or contact Jamie Peterson at Players de Noc. A minimum of five women and six men are needed with up to ten of each. Again, Andolora shows you how to double or triple-cast. Other "notes to the director": no applause until the end, prioritize actors who can sing, no



fourth wall, direct all dialogue to the audience aka the "Passersby", no intermission, use simple props and accessories to change actors to another character. And here's my favorite: all women wear hats!

The original Edgar Lee Masters' work is set in small-town Illinois circa 1890. Andolora condenses the original work from 200 plus poems to an 85–95-minute production. If not set in a cemetery, the play should have the feel of one. All actors make a slow entrance from different areas of the venue, carrying lanterns. Benches of the time period are scattered about.

The stories told by the characters reveal a small community's scandals, heartbreak, infidelity, alcoholism, and at least two murders—a veritable soap opera!

The music is integral to the story. Andolora has chosen eight songs written in the mid to late 1800s. I researched the songs and found them quite charming. "Softly and Tenderly", "In

the Gloaming", "When You and I Were Young", "Rally 'Round the Flag", "Just Before the Battle, Mother". Two dances are set to the music of "After the Ball" and "No More Hard Times Come Again" by Stephen Foster. The play ends with the full cast singing "Shall We Gather at the River" as they collect their lanterns.

Suitable for all ages, although the amount of poetry may be difficult for young children.

Blown Youth by Dipika Guha is a three-part play written in 2016 and published by Playscripts. It tracks seven women from a few years after college (Part 1), ten years after, and twelve years after. Playscripts only let me read



two-thirds for free, FYI. Four of the women create "an international feminist commune" outside Boston in an old house. The set is simple, and space is used flexibly as

the scenes and actors change quickly with the aid of a projection screen announcing the actors. A "fast forward" sound effect is used to show the passage of time. The seven women are 25 to 32 years old at the beginning. Four are American, Shia is Lebanese-Arab, Margaret is French, and Jo is Tanzanian. Celia, an unemploved actress who is ambivalent about her chosen vocation, owns the house. Margaret, her girlfriend, runs the place. Ray, ambivalently gay and pregnant, is the practical one. Anne spends every cent she earns, finds, or is given. Shia, new to the house is in the fashion industry. Audre, an actor whom Celia meets at auditions, is enamored with the house and its tenants. Jo, Tanzanian, is a neighbor with a young child.

Through the first act, we learn about the relationships and are offered a window into the lives of women in their early adulthood. Part two ends with all the characters performing a scene from Hamlet. This show would be an ideal opportunity to cast some young women from your community. Few props, lights, sound, or costumes. 16 and up.
