AACT recognizes six Michigan volunteers

Continuing their aggressive campaign to recognize community theatre volunteers, American Association of Community Theatre (AACT) announced the 2024 awardees in early summer.

Cody Colvin (pictured immediate right) from Grand Rapids founded Colvin Theatrical in 2020, with the goal of helping performing arts companies weather the pandemic through the use of film and broadcast. His most defining and rewarding work came in 2021, when he and his company created a digital solution for AACT's pandemic-impacted National Festival. Rather than the traditional in-person event, Cody worked with AACT to film all of AACTFest's outstanding production winners in their own theatres. The result was a once-in-a-lifetime, 27-day journey from coast to coast, recording 11 U.S. productions for



streaming release on Broadway on Demand. Cody is proud that Virtual AACTFest 2021 helped prove the unshakeable resilience of theatre and its makers and that new forms of media could help grow artists' reach. He has since produced a number of impactful film, television, and commercial projects, but says



his relationship with AACT has remained the highlight of his professional career.

All were individually recognized for their long and valued contributions to GPT. Dale and Dianne Pegg received Special Recognition for their many years of dedication. Harr and Schoenherr received the Robert E. Gard Superior Volunteer Award for their many years of involvement in GPT productions -- Harr with conducting and vocal leadership; Schoenherr for unlimited positions backstage, onstage and administrative. Britton received the David C. Bryant Outstanding Service Award for long-term (more than a half-century) participation in GPT, CTAM, and nationally with AACT.

A director's take on Leaving lowa

We just wrapped up a fun production of *Leaving Iowa*. Billed as 'The Comedy About Family Vacations," it was a perfect summer topic. I'm not sure who laughed more – the audiences every night, or the actors every rehearsal! Every show has a challenge or two for a director. If you are like me, that's part of the fun of directing!

For most shows, the objective is to engage the audience into the story. For this show, my objective was to trigger fond memories of their own stories.

When we remember events from decades ago, and tell the story to others, it often is bigger than life. Embellishment is an understatement – it's like the game "telephone" except we're the ones telling it over and over, and it gets bigger and wilder each time.

- The story is told through the eyes of adult Don as he remembers family vacations as a child. Not only does the actor have to play both his adult and child self, he also steps out as a narrator. Getting one actor to seamlessly step in and out of these versions of himself is one challenge.
- ✓ Next is getting Mom and Sis to also play both adult and younger versions of themselves – with a twist. They had to develop their characters both as their adult persona, yet their younger role had to be as they were remembered through Don's eyes instead of their own. Those moments need to be bigger than life – Sis more irritating, Mom calmer than any mom might normally be (until, of course, she gets really mad!).
- ✓ Dad gets to play both himself and his spirit, but not in a ghost-like way.
- ✓ And the other characters all have to be bigger than life, as remembered by Don.

Another challenge is there are no scenes per se – the characters move from one part of the stage to the next, changing back and forth from

young to old on the fly. The fast paced nature of such a show helps suspend reality for the audience – they simply don't have time to scratch their heads about one thing or another. They are compelled to just follow along. And, since I am a technical director at heart, we get to throw in some projections to create a "billboard the size of battleships" to help tell the story. Lighting, sound, props and costumes are also important to help the audience move from one element to another – a simple hat that's on or off, an apron for older mom, and even an urn to represent the journey with dad after he's passed.

So what's my take as a director? Fast paced flow through scenes with bigger than life acting and equally talented production designers make a show like this a real joy! And maybe, just maybe, you'll get a taste of our production at AACT Fest 2025!
