The Sauk to take Michigan to AACTfest Regionals

Life isn't the same around The Sauk, Hillsdale County's community theatre, since they were selected to represent Michigan at the AACTfest Region III competition!

The Sauk will compete with *Desert Song* by Mark Cornell. The theatre has a history with both Playwright Cornell and the play. The Sauk produced the world premiere production of Cornell's play *On Pine Knoll Street* in February 2020 as part of the AACT NewPlayFest. *Desert Song* was part of The Sauk's 2021 Plays-in-Development program prior to a world premiere, fully-staged production in September 2022. Cornell adapted his play to fit the competition's 60-minute time limit.

Desert Song is about a young, struggling musician who seeks out the reclusive muse for one of the most famous love songs ever written, an early seventies tune called "The Ballad of Eliza." It's a song that he has

loved all his life. This muse, a woman who would now be in her sixties, has long retreated from public view. Can he find her? Set in the sparse lodgings at Ghost Ranch, a remote retreat in Northern New Mexico, the play explores the elusive and magical nature of inspiration.

The cast for *Desert Song* consists of Summer Housler as The Maid and Darren Taylor as The Musician. The production is directed by Trinity Bird with stage management by Mandee Leigh Howard. The design team consists of Bruce Crews (set), Gianna Green

(costumes), Bird (lighting), Joella Hendrickson (sound), Cyndi Baldermann (properties) and MJ Dulmage (makeup). The production crew includes Allison Tappen and Moriah Livingston.

The Sauk will travel to Beaver Dam, Wisconsin for the Regional III (Michigan, Wisconsin, Indiana, Ohio and Illinois) competition April 28-30. The group will have a technical rehearsal in the evening of April 28 and perform at 1:30 p.m. (Central time) on Saturday, April 29. A public final dress rehearsal will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 27 at The Sauk, 240 E. Chicago St., Jonesville, Mich. Although the dress rehearsal will be free, donations will be accepted to help offset the cost of travel. Please note, this production contains strong language, stage blood and self-harm.

"We are so honored to represent the state and our vibrant theatre community at Regionals," Bird said. "We take the responsibility very seriously and hope we will present a show that will make our entire state proud." More information can be found at www.thesauk.org.

The Sauk also received two special awards for their production – Outstanding Ensemble Work and Outstanding Special Effects.

The Scoop on Scripts

This is my 59th Scoop. I started in November 2017 when Suzan Nemeth suggested this as a substitute for reading plays for just Tawas Bay Players. It has been a joy. My purpose is to find those hidden gems and a variety of genres. Many plays I found ab at CTAM conferences and AACTfest. I have enjoyed scooping the CTAM playwrighting contest winners. My goal has been to discover plays that are off the radar; I read them so you don't have to.

Clue, not the musical, was written by Sandy Rustin and based on a screenplay by Jonathan Lynch. Published by Playscripts in 2019,



this board game turned self-aware farce is great fun.

Scenes are many; it is Boddy Mansion, after all. (OMG! The Boddy/body puns are insane.) The Grand Hallway of a Gothic Victorian house on a dark and stormy night is the framework. This gloomy, almost menacing, hallway is lined with doors leading to the Study, the Lounge, the Library, the Kitchen and so on; in the author's words "various rooms...easily pulled out in surprising ways".

Costumes are important (Miss Scarlett! Mrs. White! Professor Plum!) and lots of props (the candlestick! the rope!). Other challenges/opportunities are special effects such as paintings that become animated, a trap door, etc. Sound effects for "a dark and stormy night" and a 1954 radio broadcast about the Red Scare/McCarthyism, set the 1950's tone.

Minimum cast is five females, five males, with 10-20 actors possible. Casting: ages are unimportant, but energy is super important, especially for Wadsworth, the butler. He owns this show.

Each actor is given the name of one of the

game's characters. They have a "real" name and a big secret. Mr. Boddy is blackmailing each one.

Years ago I tried to read this play but the stage directions just about killed me. In January I saw a wonderful production at the Osceola Center for the Arts (OCA) in Kissimmee, Florida. This is a semi-professional theatre but with a talented cast and a director who enjoys fast pacing, this would be a hit. Note: OCA attained the audience numbers they had before the pandemic, as well as attracting a younger demographic. Seems the millennials have fond memories of this board game and the 1985 movie. Yes, an ambitious undertaking, but a real audience pleaser for ages 12 and up.



The book, Stories on Stage:
Twenty-two Readers' Theatre
Scripts Adapted from Children's
Literature for Elementary and
Junior High School Students by
Aaron Shepard ©1993 is filled
with short, amusing scripts for
classrooms and youth theatre.
On the flyleaf, it says "The
scripts are reproducible for easy

use." And yes, they are 8" by 11". In the foreword, Shepard says his primary goal is to promote reading. The plays are written for kids to perform, but obviously, older children and adults could have fun. The table of contents states each play's genre, culture, theme, grade level for performing, number of roles, and length. Variety in cultures, genres, and themes make this a treasure trove. I appreciate Shepard's note in the foreword: "Although special effort has been made to include scripts with strong females, Stories on Stage still reflects the dominance of male characters in literature for both children and adults. I recommend that you compensate for this by casting females in male roles." Pretty advanced thinking for 1993, I'd say.

The chosen stories display a wide range of classic children's books like *Millions of Cats* by Wanda Gag, *Three Sideways Stories from Wayside School* by Louis Sachar, *The Twits' Revenge* by Roald Dahl, and *McBroom's Fourth of July* by Sid Fleischman, along with ancient tales from many cultures. Several new pieces are also included.
